



Frequently Asked Questions

What are the key dates for the community grant program?

- Application Workshop - November 24, 2011
- Application deadline - December 31, 2011
- Grant recipients notified – January 15, 2012
- Project completion deadline - April 1, 2012
- Project report deadline – May 1, 2012

What happens to applications once they are received?

Grant proposal review: Applications will be reviewed by the UTown@UBC Community Grants Selection Committee made up of representatives from Campus and Community Planning, the UNA and Student Housing and Hospitality Services. The Selection Committee will determine which projects receive grants based on the applicant eligibility funding criteria.

Awarding of grants: Applicants will be notified if they have been awarded a UTown@UBC Community Grant in early January 2012. The Selection Committee will provide grant recipients with one-on-one consultation during the implementation of projects to help recipients achieve success.

If I receive a community grant how should I identify that funding was provided by the UTown@UBC Community Grant Program?

Grant recipients will be provided with UTown@UBC and UNA logos as well as information about ways to identify that funding was provided by the UTown@UBC Community Grant. Logos can be used in communication and promotional materials such as posters, brochures and programs. Signage will also be provided for use during events. In addition, members of the Selection Committee will be available to participate in events and deliver remarks about UTown@UBC where appropriate.

What is the evaluation report that grant recipients have to complete?

When you are awarded a Community Grant you will be provided with an evaluation report template. The evaluation report is due no later than one month after the conclusion of the project.
